2	Your EPG – What is it?			
	Unlike a Will, an EPG can and will only be valid whilst you are alive. An EPG enables you to give another person the legal authority to make personal, lifestyle and treatment decisions on your behalf. It only takes effect if you lose capacity.			
3	Your Enduring Guardian			
	Your Enduring Guardian must act in accordance with the <i>Guardianship and Administration Act</i> (1990) which requires them to act in your best interests. This involves being an advocate for you and to act in such a way which: (a) encourages you to live and participate in the general community;			
	(a) encourages you to live and participate in the general confindinty, (b) encourages and assists you to become capable of caring for yourself;			
	(c) protects you from abuse, neglect and exploitation;			
	(d) maintains any supportive relationships you have and your familiar cultural, linguistic and religious environment; and			
	(e) takes into account your wishes and is least restrictive of your rights.			
	Your Enduring Guardian is not permitted to vote for you in an election, consent to an adoption, consent to a marriage involving you or a person under 18 years of age, consent to you being sterilised without the approval of the State Administrative Tribunal or make or change your Will without an order from the Supreme Court.			

	You must appoint someone who you trust, as an EPG is a powerful instrument. Your Enduring Guardian will be responsible for your personal, lifestyle and treatment decisions and as such you should have faith in their ability to be able to make these decisions for you.
	Your Enduring Guardian may be any legally competent person/s over the age of 18 years.
	You can appoint any person of your choice (or more than one person) to be your Enduring Guardian.
	There is no restriction on the number of Enduring Guardians that you can appoint. However, if you appoint more than one Enduring Guardian then they must act jointly on all decisions. You should therefore ensure that if you do appoint more than one Enduring Guardian then they will be able to jointly make decisions on your behalf.

	Please see the <u>attached</u> list of persons who can witness your EPG and note that, if your EPG is not witnessed in accordance with the Act, it will be <u>invalid</u> .
7	Revoking your EPG
	If you no longer require your EPG to apply, you must inform your Enduring Guardians and Substitute Enduring Guardians and all other relevant agencies in writing of your revocation of your EPG.
